FROM THE VILLAGE BOARD--

Highlights of the January Board Meeting:

The village board approved the following:

- *Operator license for Billie Kieso.
- *Payment request #5 to SMA Construction Services in the amount of \$109,727.12 for the Well #4 building project.
- *Engineering contract for the new ballfield lights with Muermann Engineering for a cost of \$5,750.
- *To allow 11 firemen to attend the firemen's convention in Green Bay at a cost of \$90 each.
- *Two easements with WE Energies for upgrades to their electrical system on Birch St. and into the Civic Park.

The village board received notification of the following:

- *Taxes collected to 12/31/12. Total collected was \$588,519.24 or 41.26% compared to \$578,158.61 or 41.59% last year.
- *Listing of 2013 Hilbert Volunteer Fire Department officers.

FIREMEN'S PICNIC/PARADE & FIREWORKS

Bill Koehler reported to the Village Board that the fire department voted on changes to be made for the fire department's annual fundraising picnic this year. SPRING CLEAN

The Village of Hilbert will again conduct a Spring Clean this year. This allows residents to dispose of larger ticket items such as couches, chairs, washers, dryers, etc. This event is scheduled for May 4, 2013 from 8 a.m. – 11 a.m. at the gravel parking lot across from the community center/fire station building. As was done in the past, this will be a drop off site where you will bring the materials for disposal. We are looking at a few changes to make this process smoother. CALUMET COUNTY CLEAN SWEEP PROGRAM

Advanced Disposal Landfill and Calumet County are teaming up to offer several Hazardous Waste Clean Sweep collection sites which are free for residents and farmers, and at a reduced-cost for businesses. Electronics are accepted at a cost of \$1.00 per item. Residents and farmers from throughout Calumet County can deliver hazardous wastes to the Town of Harrison Garage at the intersection of Highway 114 and State Park Road from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m. Saturday, April 20, or to the New Holstein Public Works Garage at the intersection of Taft St. and Mason Ave. on Saturday, May 11 from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m. Any Calumet County business that is regulated as a small quantity generator of hazardous waste is eligible to participate in any of the Clean Sweep programs for a fee. For participation details, contact the UW Extension office. Hazardous wastes are products whose labels include the words caution, poison, combustible, danger, warning, flammable, or corrosive. Hazardous wastes that can be brought to the Clean Sweep include, but are not limited to, solvents, fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides (including DDT and chlordane), rodent baits, lead and oil based paints, kitchen and bathroom cleaners, bug sprays, and auto products such as used oil, old gasoline, transmission fluid and antifreeze. Latex paint IS NOT ACCEPTED.

WINTER PARKING & SNOW REMOVAL REGULATIONS

(E) SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL

Residents of the village shall be required to remove snow and ice on street sidewalks and driveway entrances within 24 hours after a snowfall, sleet or drifting. If the owner or occupant has not cleared the sidewalk or driveway entrance within this time, the Director of Public Works shall have the Village clerk contact the homeowner or occupant and notify them of this ordinance. If the owner or occupant does not take action to clear the sidewalk or driveway entrance within 24 hours, the Director of Public Works shall have the sidewalk and driveway entrance cleared at the owner's expense. If the owner or occupant of any residence is so notified once during a single snow season, no further notification shall be required upon the subsequent occurrence of a snowfall, sleet or drifting, and the Director of Public Works shall have the sidewalk and driveway entrance cleared within 24 hours. The cost of clearing the sidewalk and driveway entrance shall be \$.60 per lineal foot.

(F) SNOW ON STREETS.

No person in clearing snow from their lots, sidewalks, driveways, filling stations, garages or other areas shall pile or distribute snow in the street alleyway or any portion of the street right of way, within the Village which in any way tends to narrow the traveled portion of the street, block the vision of motorists at intersections, prevent parking at the curb, or in any other way impede snow removal or create a traffic hazard. Persons having such an accumulation of snow shall remove the same at their own expense without depositing the same in the public streets or public right of way. Any person violating Section 5.04(F) shall be required to forfeit \$15.00 plus the cost of removal.

7. OVERNIGHT PARKING. No person shall park or leave standing any vehicle or equipment upon any of the streets or alleyways of the Village of Hilbert between 3 a.m. and 7 a.m.; commencing November 15 and extending to April 15, except physicians on emergency calls.
